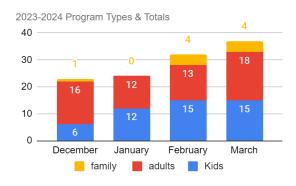
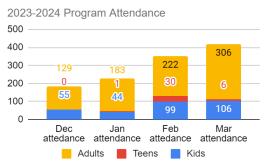
LIBRARY & RESOURCE USE

Programs:





The takeaway here is that we are headed in the direction we need to be going. Over the first quarter of 2024, we steadily increased both the number of programs and program attendance. The difference is coming from youth and family programs. The vast majority of adult programs are yoga over Zoom which maintains a steady range of 9-21 participants with a rough average of 14.

New programming includes a second weekly preschool program, both weekly & monthly afterschool programs and, for March, a robust slate of youth programs during Spring Break. Having new programs across a range of interests attracts new participants to more established programs as well. However, the biggest reason for increases in attendance at established programs is increasing use of an organization and planning system that means DPL is planning ahead which allows for adequate marketing time through social media and the schools.

A program highlight for March was Zoomba Battle Bots. A collaboration with Pawling Library, the program had kids aged 9-14 using mini robot vacuums as the bases for challenges. On its face, the program may not sound educational, but in practice kids in teams of 2-3 had to work together, use the Scientific Method and principles of physics in order to be successful in both the group challenge of herding ball pit balls across a finish line and in the individual team challenge of balloon joust. After 2 and a half hours the kids still wanted to do more and we promised future programs in the same vein. Working with Pawling was an advantage as we were able to share the expenses of the robots and ensure that we could keep some robots always charging while still having enough teams to make it fun and interesting.

Circulation

Physical Circulation is down slightly compared to last month, but the trend is in keeping with first quarters generally. As the weather improves, circulation tends to dip. The only number I'm unhappy about is the 97 holds. These are holds requests to be picked up in Dover; so I like to see these on the rise as they're an indicator that people are using the library. But, as a staff member pointed out, there may be fewer holds because people are finding more that interests them on the new shelves. Also, this year Spring Break was in March which is anomalous.

Digital Circulation is comparable to previous months generally speaking. The Libby March 2024 numbers are not yet compiled, but generally DPL has 500-525 circulations there each month. The e-magazines have been re-packaged and are incredibly easy now, so we will do a feature on those in one of the Libby social media posts in April. Hoopla is similar to January usage, though patrons are choosing newer and thus slightly more expensive items.

The March Staff Meeting included detailed information about the Simple IRA and other benefits approved at the March Board meeting.

The locksmith took measurements and added the library's bathrooms to his work schedule. The electrician looked at the stairwell fixture that the Town has a replacement for but can't

The electrician also sent his lighting expert who managed to stop by when I was out, but he took measurements also and I've called to follow up.

The DES & WES combined Art Show is hanging in the library's lobby and mezzanine. It's really terrific. Thanks to Barry and Joe for installing the additional galley ledges in the lobby. These two extra allowed 15 more kids to participate in the show. Thanks to my mom for hanging out with me while I painted the lobby wall that had been behind a bulletin board.
